Clover and Our Prideful Nature

I have a confession to make: I am not a gardener. There. I admitted it. Why don't I feel any better? Where is the relief that's supposed to come from being open about one's short comings!? I've never successfully raised a tomato crop on my own. Come to think of it, I haven't even managed to raise zucchini without gardening intervention. People often tell me that "anyone can raise

zucchini". It appears that I'm not just anyone.

My skills in the yard are different. I have a kneeling bench. Some folks think it's a gardener's support cushion, but I know differently. My family gave me this bench as a gift to be used as I move about the dirt, rearranging it, taking out uninvited plants and those plants that are past their prime, placing something fresh in their stead. While on my knees, it happens without my knowing...I begin to pray...not just that the Lord will allow me to stand again, but for my neighbors, family, friends. I listen to God's voice whispering His nudgings in my ear. As I pray, I often hear hymns and songs of praise in the background. I begin to remember the Scriptures, sometimes accurately.

While in the front yard, I meet others from within the neighborhood at large. Most of whom I don't know by name, or even which house they live in, only their habits. There's the lady with three small dogs, each one walked separately throughout the day. There's the couple who, while older than myself, speed-walk. Several canines in the area walking different humans from their home. The umbrella lady who likes to cook with rosemary. The darling aged couple who shuffle along, holding hands, taking turns with the leash, smiling with the joy of another day. The siblings, riding their bikes and scooters around 3 p.m. every school day. The young adults pushing strollers, pulling wagons, cajoling toddlers to stay on the sidewalk and not wander into the street. The grandparents who insist on holding the toddlers' hands. I get to pray for them all!

As I reach to follow that clover whose vines are choking plants that I set in place on purpose, I remember Jesus telling us, "I am the vine, you are the branches." Yes, I know that He was speaking of grapes and how we're to serve Him by producing fruit, but I'm in the moment. Consider the irony that clover is. Clover is helpful, as it provides nitrogen to the earth. It's edible, providing fruit for tea or jelly. It's also invasive and will rule the yard if allowed to run free, taking



no prisoners (wasn't Paul in prison over two years?), leaving destruction of even the heartiest drought tolerant grasses in its wake. Clover may serve as an analogy of our prideful nature, even if it's well-intended in service to our Lord (Pharisees and Sadducees?).

How have I learned these and many other references? The same way you do. Daily. I spend purposeful, meaningful time in the Word; considering the messages and the history of my faith in God through Jesus Christ. If you haven't created a daily habit of reading your Bible, you can start today. Happy weeding!


We Covet Your Prayers

Oroville Mission Trip PDA Oroville, California June 6-12, 2021

"Trust in the Lord with all your heart and lean not on your own understanding; in all your ways submit to him, and he will make your paths straight." —Proverbs 3:5-6 NIV

It happens every time the wind blows down from the mountains.

Melissa's blood runs cold as she remembers the awful morning of November 8, 2018 when the sky east of Paradise turned black. Wind speeds up to 50MPH drove a blowtorch of death into Paradise and the neighboring towns of Concow and Magalia. "We didn't wait for the evacuation notice to drive out through flaming trees," she recalls. "We just got in the car and left." As a result, Melissa and her family were able to find lodging in nearby Chico. Other residents of Paradise weren't so lucky. 86 residents eventually died in the holocaust. Nearly 95% of the town's structures—nearly 19,000 including 14,000 homes—were destroyed.

Named after Camp Creek Road, where a faulty electrical transmission line triggered the blaze in the Feather River Canyon 12 miles east of Paradise, the Camp Fire eventually covered 239 square miles to become the deadliest and most destructive wildfire in California history. The total damage was estimated at \$16.5 billion, of which \$4 billion was uninsured.

Nearly a month passed before Paradise residents were allowed back in town to see

what was left. "It looked like World War III," Melissa recalled. At the height of the post-fire clean up, debris trucks ran constantly for 16 hours a day. While some people decided to leave, the majority of Paradise citizens opted to return. Melissa went to work coordinating relief efforts at the Alliance church in Paradise. Two and a half years later—long after Paradise dropped off the map of media scrutiny—rebuilding is underway.

Earlier this spring, an advance party of Trinity United Presbyterian Disaster Assistance volunteers journeyed to Paradise for a look at the work awaiting our team during the week of June 6. Your PDA team will be working out of Trinity Presbyterian Church in Oroville, PDA's host site for projects in the Paradise area. We'll be showering, sleeping, and cooking our meals at the church while commuting to various work locations in Butte County.

The Hope Crisis Response Network will coordinate our work projects. A faith-based Indiana humanitarian organization established in 1999, Hope Crisis has followed a path similar to PDA's, dealing with man-made and natural disasters across the United States. With a mission to "Rebuild Homes and Restore" Lives," Hope Crisis approaches recovery from a holistic viewpoint, addressing physical damage as well as emotional and spiritual needs in the communities it serves. The group emphasizes the importance of a person's faith as only God heals wounds. Partnering with FEMA, Hope Crisis provides help to families that may or may not be eligible for federal assistance. Families receiving help agree to work with a case manager, and all services are provided free of charge or discrimination.

A real pioneering spirit permeates Paradise in 2021. Hope Crisis began rebuilding homes this spring, with sites in Paradise and Magalia. In addition to construction, our PDA team anticipates jobs doing debris removal, cutting logs, helping in a soup kitchen, and working with other service agencies. While we're trading water for fire in terms of the damage we'll be addressing, our work will be much the same as in previous years. We won't know our

assignments until we get to Oroville, but we do know one thing: we're back in business! After the turmoil of the past year, it's great to see "normal" coming back to life.

As we begin our 14th mission trip over the past 15 years, we give thanks for another opportunity to bring hope out of chaos for people whose lives have been disrupted by nature's wrath. After 13 years on the road, from the Gulf Coast of Mississippi and Louisiana to Tennessee, Pennsylvania, New York, New Jersey, and North Carolina, it's a blessing being able to "take care of our own" in northern California.

Once again, we gratefully reflect on the amazing support we have received from the Trinity family since 2007. Our team has never ceased to be amazed by the financial backing we've received over the years. Miraculously, that support has continued, despite the disruption of 2020's "lost year."

Above all, we thank you for the prayer support you have provided us over the years. The work isn't easy. We face a number of challenges, starting with warm weather. Oroville can be hot in early summer, and we expect to get sweaty and dirty. When our energy ebbs and the projects seem most demanding, the power of your collective prayers renews our spirits.

We look forward to bringing that strength to Paradise.
